Regulatory Structure

Competent Authority – Department for Transport (DfT)
(Responsible for the secure carriage of dangerous goods except Class 7)



DGSA situation in the UK

DGSA's who qualified in the UK – approximately 2000

- includes Irish & US citizens
- 100 (approximately) from Hong Kong
- of those that work in the UK split 50/50 between employed/consultants

UK exams

- ADR, 3 – All Classes, Core & Road
- Administered by SQA – no contact with external bodies
- Pass mark approx' 65% (at least 50% 1st timers fail)
 - RID & ADN also available

Recognition

- Totally varies between companies, but poor on average



DGSA situation in the UK

ADR on the road

- Police (Commercial Vehicle Units) working with DVSA
- Not all police forces have a qualified DGSA
- DfT Land Security Division do HCDG inspections
- Prosecutions by Health & Safety Executive (HSE)
- ADR violations normally added to other violations, rare on their own. Fines are % of turnover

RID

- British Transport Police

ADN

- UK not a signatory (no international borders)
- At least 10 qualified people – some to have the ‘set’

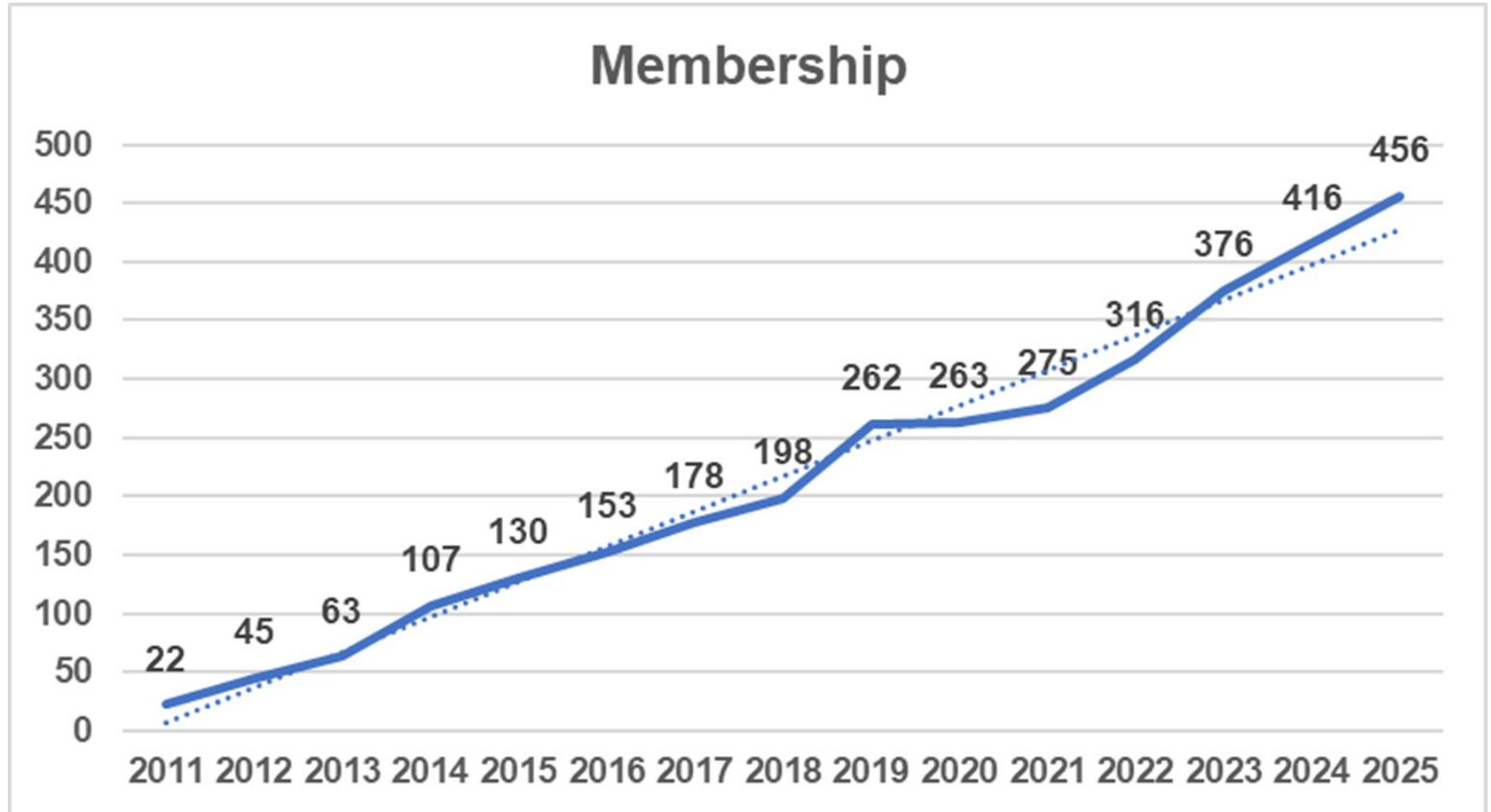


WHO?

- 462 members

WHAT?

- The GB based professional body for those involved in Transport of Dangerous Goods
 - In ***any*** role
 - Covering ***all*** Classes
 - For ***all*** modes of transport (including ADN)
- To educate, inform and support members
- To advocate with government, CA and other industry bodies & associations
- Non-profit making



WHEN?

2008, Department for Transport (DfT) called a meeting to express concern about loss of expertise in the field of TDGs

- **1st June 2010**, a meeting to discuss the formation of a professional association
 - Attended & supported by representatives of government and industry
- **26th July 2010**, BADGP was formally born
 - 1st Chairman Andy Holton & Committee formed



WHY?

BADGP was born to address the following 'deficiencies' in the Transport of Dangerous Goods area:

- Professionals had little/no support organisations
- Few outside channels existed to maintain/enhance skills
- No-one was directly advocating for DG 'professionals' & expertise was increasingly being lost
- Some countries had 'support' organisations & there were attempts to create a 'European Federation of National Associations'
- No UK organisation = No UK representation



HOW?

- AGM & (themed) Industry Seminar in March
 - 2025 'Containment' theme
 - 160 attendees
 - 12 sponsors
 - Officials from DfT, VCA, DVSA & ONR
 - Free to members
- Seminars – annually in the Autumn
 - Lithium Batteries 9th September 2025
 - Previous seminars on Class1, Class7, Emergency Response
 - Discounted member rates

HOW?

- Webinars – normally 4 per year
 - ADR upcoming changes overview (by DfT) biannually
 - Changes to IMDG & IATA
 - Lithium batteries (4 in the last 6 years)
 - Packaging & labelling
 - Enforcement
 - From member requests or current ‘hot’ topics’

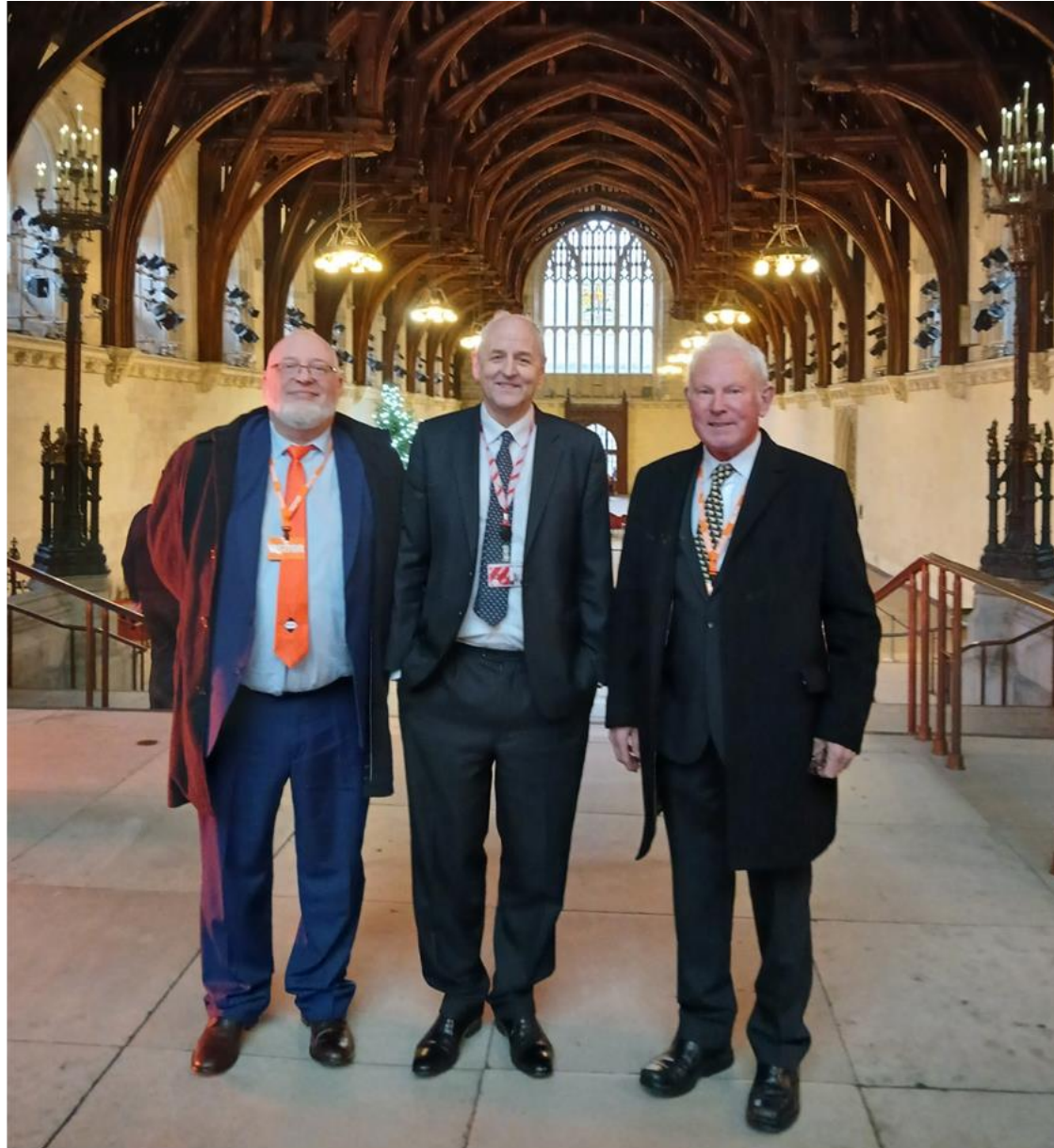

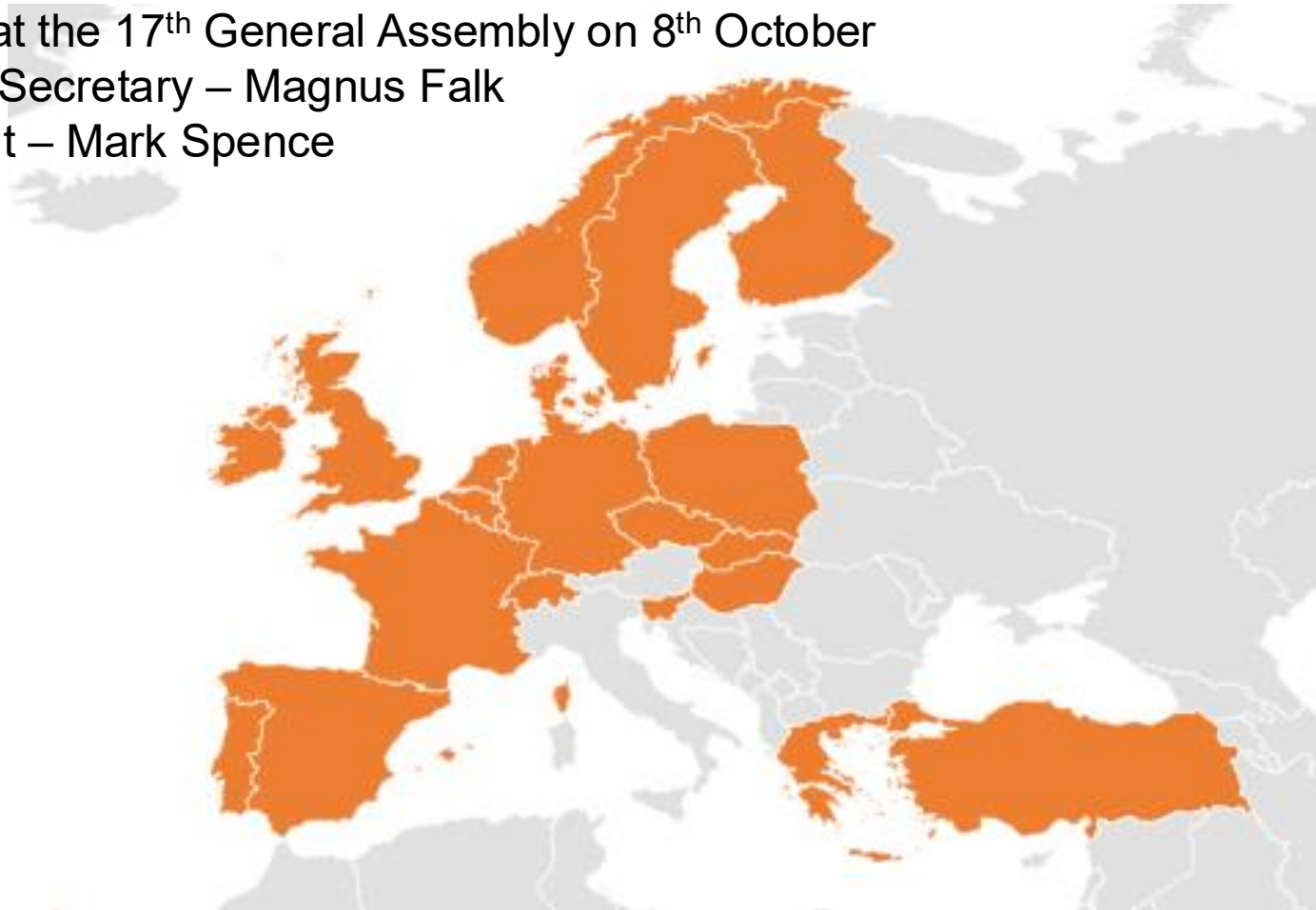
